

Financial Overview of Club



Club revenues have increased by about \$7k for seven months July to January inclusive, compared to the same period last financial year, with the increase mainly due to improved Advertising and Sponsorship. Once again, the Club has received \$5,000 sponsorship from Teak Events for the 2019 Peter Teakle Wines Port Lincoln BWC tournament - thank you, Peter!

Expenses were on par with last year's result, with lower rents but additional outgoings. Function and tournament expenses were lower.

Receivables were at \$1k at the end of January with Pacific Marine the sole debtor.

Other than day to day running costs, the Club has no financial liabilities.

Year to date receipts totalled more than \$54k compared to \$47k last year. Total expenses at the end of January were \$21k compared to \$22k last year. Interest receipts lifted the current surplus to \$34k compared to \$22k last year. The Club had over \$186k in cash assets out of a total of \$330k all assets.





The other days we came in a bit later and must of missed them.

Our South Island Adventure



We flew into Christchurch and immediately you could see the reminisce of the Earthquake that hit in 2011 killing 185 people and injured another 2000. The city still has so many vacant lots that multi-storey buildings once stood. Even though it has been through all the devastation Christchurch is very pretty with its countless gardens and the beautiful Avon River running through the city.

Our plans were to drive around the whole island so we decided to head North first and stop at Limestone Hill truffle farm. Gabriella had arranged a guide who had a very impressive dog named Rosy who would sniff out truffles underground. We spent a few hours digging up truffles and ended up with a perfect amount for pasta with truffles. We stopped at one of the lovely Wairapa region wineries and bought a bottle of wine to match. We searched for a place to set camp for the night and found a beautiful spot near a crystal clear stream and enjoyed our dinner under the star filled sky. We woke early the next morning and departed for the Abel Tasman National Park. The Abel Tasman is renowned for its golden beaches, sculptured granite cliffs, and its world-famous coastal tracks. We jumped into our ocean kayak at set off for an anchorage called Frenchman Bay.





The 3 hour kayaking trip to get there was beautiful, the seas were calm, the water clear and we loved watching the seals swimming under the kayak. We got to our anchorage, dragged the kayak up the beach, got changed into our hiking gear and began our 12km hike through the beautiful lush green forest, the scenery was breathtaking.

Getting to our next destination Franz Josef glacier was truly one of the most spectacular scenic drives we have ever experienced. The alps stretch 500km and here you see snow peaked towering alps that meet peaceful sounds and rugged coastlines merge with sweeping plains. We arrived at the base of the glacier and had a helicopter arranged to drop us off for a 4 hour guided hike. Our guide lead us through some of the most spectacular ice formations, caves, tunnels and crevasses, it's was truely inspiring.

As we were driving around the South Island there was always something exciting to see and do. There were so many wineries to stop at, lakes to fish from, walking treks and the scenery was simply stunning. We were lucky enough to be there through white bait season. For 2 months of the year the locals are allowed to fish for white bait, we would see hundreds of people lining the rivers edge waiting for the white bait to come in at high tide. They were always so generous in sharing there catch with us and allowing us to have a go, however they are very protective over there spot, we saw numerous argument between locals.



One of the most exiting things I have ever done was helicopter hunting. Gabriella and I would pack our backpacks with enough food and water for the day as well as a little compact cooker, a GPS, satellite phone, rifle and of course a fishing rod. The helicopter would drop us off on these amazing snowy mountains in the middle of no where and not return for 8 hours. It was such a serial feeling jumping out of a hovering helicopter in the most beautiful remote locations. We would spend the day trekking through the most unbelievable spectacular terrain, sometimes falling through the thick snow into the stream below. We would often stop for a quick coffee or to cook some food, we even tried flicking some lures in the most crystal clear pristine streams we have ever seen. Once we found a suitable location for the chopper to land we would message the GPS coordinates to the pilot and wait for our ride out.

We enjoyed this so much we continued to do this a few more times on our travels around the South Island, we even met a helicopter pilot Bill who has been shooting and recovering deer for export market for 40 years. After some gentle persuasion I finally convinced him to let me shoot from the chopper for him. It took some getting use to, flying around with no door on the helicopter. As he would spot an animal he would put the helicopter in this incredibly steep turn, I had one hand on the rifle and the other was gripped tightly onto the chopper, despite his efforts to reassure me I didn't need to hold on as I wouldn't fall out, I kept holding on. We spent the afternoon shooting deer, goats and pigs and marking the location with his GPS. Once we finished shooting we then backtracked to where we had shot the animals, he would hover the chopper over the steep terrain and I would jump out place a rope around the animal.



He would then land the chopper on top of me so I could hook the rope up to the helicopter. Once we had 7 to 10 deer hooked on to the chopper we would return to his house to drop them off. We continued to do this until we collected all of the deer.



As we continued our drive around the South Island, the adventures just got better, todays adventure was bungee jumping. Gabriella had been talking about doing this for some time now, i didn't think she would have had the courage to go through with it. It was a 134 meter drop and 8.5 second free fall. As I watched her prepare for the jump my heart was racing, I could only imagine what hers was doing. She stood at the end of the platform, 3,2,1 and without any hesitation she jumped. I watched as she dropped 134 meters and then was dangling like a tea bag being dipped in a cup. She did it, I was definitely impressed and definitely not going to do it myself.



We spent the next 3 days on a farm as helping hands, we would wake early in the morning and help hand feed the 80 new born calves. This was a huge job preparing the milk, feeding them and then having to clean it all up. We also went out with the farmer to round up his cattle, not that we can really call that work, watching the dogs round up all the cattle was fascinating. From helicopter rides and white water rafting, to low level flights in a biplane and catching fresh water salmon, the adventures continued. We even went hot air ballooning, we connect the basket to the ballon then watched as the balloon slowly inflated, we jumped into the basket and lifted off. It was such a beautiful, peaceful experience floating through the sky with no control over the steering and watching the sun



After spending 6 weeks on the South Island the time had come for us to leave, we will never forget all the incredible adventures we have experienced. The island is truly a spectacular place, not just for its scenery or all the adventures that it holds but the backbone of the island, the most down-to-earth locals you'll ever meet.

As we sit at the airport waiting to board our plane back to Auckland, reality sets in as we realise that our New Zealand Adventures have almost come to an end. We need to start preparing ourselves as well as the boat for the 1200nm trip back to Australia.

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

A TRIP TO REMOTE PORT DAVEY ON MV HUNTRESS AND THE NEW MV MAITA'I HOBART TO BRUNY ISLAND

MV HUNTRESS

During December and January Bob (Hill), Owen and myself had a very special boating experience in Tasmania. We enjoyed the company of some great friends and family. In mid-January, we were really looking forward to catching up with our friends from Adelaide; Rolf, Ralph, Susan and Harry Czabayski.

After a lot of excitement and loading all the 'supplies', we departed the Prince of Wales Marina, Hobart. MV Huntress and the new MV Maitai headed south along the Derwent River.



Cruising under the Tasman
Bridge, was an eerie feeling to
think about the accident that
occurred in 1975 when a bulk ore
carrier collided with pylons on the
eastern side. The bridge collapsed
onto the deck of the ship. The
highest, most central point of the
bridge is now reserved for large
cargo ships only to traverse under.



We swung west at Dennes Point, Bruny Island, into the beautiful d'Entrecasteaux channel- a boating paradise. Surrounded by stunning scenery, we anchored at Barnes Bay for the night. A quick search revealed the Bruny Island Whiskey House was not too far away. Scouting for a way on to land, we navigated the tender between the oysters and made our way up through some private property and barbed wire to reach the Whisky House!

Unfortunately, (or maybe fortunately) they were closing and the tasting session was over. We purchased a few bottles of Tasmanian Whisky and Gin for our trip, making back for Huntress and our own private tasting and told stories late into the night...



Day 2 saw us starting late. Ralph decided Tasmanian whisky was not for him! Around the corner in Great Bay we anchored on a windy day. The tender battery was flat, but after some superb electrical work by Rolf and Ralph, they had us going again. A short walk along the beach took us to the Bruny Island Cheese Company and the oyster bar, Get Shucked! Both are excellent and a must to visit in Tasmainia. After lunch, we cruised south at 38 knots to discover the beautiful and historical Recherche Bay - the most southern point to which you can drive in Australia.



French Captain, Bruni d'Entrecasteaux stopped here for 4 weeks in 1792, searching for the lost explorer La Perouse. They also performed scientific research and collected botanical specimens. During the 1830's and 40's, it was a whaling station and then later became important for timber. We put the lobster pots down for night.

Day 3 dawned with excitement and enthusiasm – finally the fishing was to begin. Pedra Branca is a famous rock in the Southern Ocean teeming with life. Surrounded by seals, diving gannets, albatross and whales, ocean life abounds. The targets for the day were blue fin tuna and trumpeter – quite a large, dense fish but very tasty!

Previously at Flinders Island, Bob had caught quite a few, however they remained elusive on the South East Cape. Always a skillful fisherman, Ralph the caught two. Lucky we had him on board or we would have been eating tuna all week!

The new Maita'i 66' proved to be a formidable machine. A plan was made to visit Pedra Branca again the next day and weather permitting, round the South East Cape to Port Davey. Luckily, the wind dropped and we had a great day of fishing, visiting the abalone divers at Matsuyker Island and then winding our way in through the lobster -loaded Breaksea Islands.

What waited for us were the most majestic mountain ranges. It appeared to be snow capping them. On closer inspection, these white patches were actually quartzite rock. The beaches were filled with small white rounded stones.











The water was clean but the colour of black tea from running off through the immense mountainous wilderness. This area is officially like no other. Due to the colour of the water, no plant life grows in this area. The darkness creates a space for creatures that normally live hundreds of metres under the ocean to live in 4-15 metres of water.

It felt like a million miles from anywhere. There were two yachts anchored in a space six times larger than Sydney Harbour. The sun set over the mountains and the boat gently swung with the tide.

It was a totally different story the next morning. The notorious south-wester came howling in. One thing I learned from our adventure in Tasmania is that the wind can literal swing 360 degrees in a day. Fishing was out so we decided on a walk up a mountain, following the young Owen and Harry along the wombat trails.

Further east, into the huge Port, we went exploring Bathurst Harbour and Melaleuca. This is where the famous Deny King lived almost his entire life. I would strongly recommend reading his biography, King of the Wilderness – the Life of Deny King. This man toughed it out as tin miner in one of the most remote places on earth until he was in his 70's. His museum is quite interesting and tells the story of resourcefulness, resilience and friendship, opening the South East Cape to bushwalkers and nature lovers. Eventually he cemented the conservation of the South West Cape. We were all inspired by him.







Game Fishing with Sea Baby IV

Growing up as a kid from the country it was always my favourite time of the year when we went for our family holidays to the coast marlin fishing. Over these early decades I remember watching my father bring marlin to land and the pure excitement that was had.

I guess those early days are what set the tone for me as a game fisherman. Once I was out of school and earning my own money the real adventures begun and my life goals started add up.

Firstly there was my passion for catching jumbo Bluefin and I spent many holidays over a few years travelling the world capturing over 100 Giant Bluefin weighing up to 918lbs.



Purchasing my fish Sportsfishing boat which was a 40' O'Brien called Manu-Kai, I had an awesome time catching many black and striped marlin from Cairns to Bermagui including my first two fish that were 10-1's on line class.

During that season it became extremely evident that we were asking so much of an old boat, the bills were adding up at a phenomenal rate just trying to keep the boat going.

So when a fully refurbished and one of Cairns all time classic boat 'Sea Baby IV' came up for sale I had to have it.

Fast forward 7 months from purchase we have dialled the boat in catching upwards of a dozen Blue Marlin on the Gold Coast, having a day out with just my wife and I on the boat catching and releasing 7 Striped Marlin in a day, fishing solo and catching a Shortbill Spearfish, many Dolphin fish over 20kgs and having a 500lb Blue Marlin miss the bite all in one day, now we have just captured our first Pending Australian record. To say we are happy with the boat would be an understatement.



Making the move with the boat to Bermagui we set our sites on capturing the 4kg Striped Marlin record.

On the first day out on 4kg we switch a hot striped marlin around 90kg that went crazy jumping through the main line loosing that one.

The very next day we were back out and around 9am we switched a beautiful marlin that did all the right things perfect tease perfect bite, the fish sat down about 20m sulking for about 15minutes before deciding it wasn't very happy with the situation and came to the surface jumping.

With some exceptional boat driving by captain Dave Cassar we got the fish on the leader for a gaff shot but unfortunately the hook tore out of the fishes mouth as the gaffs were going in and we lost it.

An hour later we found another marlin feeding on a bait ball, we positioned and got a bait in the right spot to get the bite. This fish was stubborn and for the next hour we worked the angles on the fish as it refused to leave the safely of the bait ball, we watched many marlin come and feed from the bait ball but persisted with our fish we already had hooked up.

As this was happening the wind had blown up to around 30knots and was beginning to make it hard.

Eventually this fish made a mistake and came to the surface doing really lazy jumps and we were right there with it, captain Cassar put the fishes tail basically in the exhaust pipe trying to get the leader while it was jumping but the leader was under its tail and the was nothing to grab and the fish went deep.

After 3 hours of changing angles working the fish trying to get it to react we decided we had lost to the belly in the line and the weather.

Fast forward 10 more fish we had been extremely close to a few but unable to get gaffs in.

As with all fishing the perfect days do come along and we finally had our day. On the back of a 35 knots Southerly (which we had fished) we ran back out to where the fish were the previous day, caught all our bait and started teasing.

It wasn't long and we had a Striped Marlin chasing our teaser, perfect tease and I switched it onto a live slimy.

This was going to be our fish, it swam away from us pretty unhappy with the fact there was a hook in its breakfast- at around the 5 minute mark it came to the surface jumping like mad the weather conditions were on our side the marlin pulled every move with us spinning two complete circles which it jumped around before it settled into down sea jumps which put the odds in our favour.

Every jump it made down sea we closed the gap as we surfed down the waves after it.

Getting the leader 'Statue' got a good wrap, the marlin swam across the transom and our momentum going backwards pulled it

up along the starboard side of the boat.

The first gaff went it as it jumped forward but this tore out just as the second gaff went in on the next jump, third gaff was in followed by our meat hook and the fish was ours!! All before 7am!

We looked at the Marlin on the deck, measured it and knew it was close but the day was only young so we decided to keep fishing- after a cheeky celebration beer!!

15 minutes later we switched another around 75kgs on 4kg line which we caught and I decided to let go as it was smaller than the one we already had.

By the time the afternoon came around we had exhausted every formula for working out the weights and had worked out that the fish was going to be extremely close so at 3pm we ran it to the weigh station.

Hoisting it up it went 82.7kg on 4kg making it a Pending Australian record.

This fish will be the first of many we will take, it's so good when the extreme preparation and 15hour days on the water we go through start to pay off.

We now know we can successfully land our Marlin on light tackle and will work our way through the line classes.

A BLAST FROM THE PAST 1950

Club's Governor of S.A. Sir Willoughby Norrie

2,225 lb WHITE SHARK CAUGHT ON Rod and Line But not claimed As World Record

On March 15th 1950, Sir Willoughby Norrie hooked, played and landed a "White Pointer Shark "of Port Lincoln, South Australia. This was officially weighed at 2,225lb and is believed the largest shark ever caught on Rod and Line. Due to the kind co-operation of Mr. E.W. Palmer. Honorary Secretary of the Game Fishing Club of South Australia, we are able to publish an exclusive account of this outstanding achievement.

Who is this sporting Angler?

Born in London in 1893, and educated at Eton College, Sir Willoughby Norrie served in both World Wars, was wounded on four occasions, receiving many Decorations for gallantry. He has never visited America, but hopes to pass through New York early this May, and will visit his Grandfather's former house, 253, Fifth Avenue, Sold by the Norrie family in 1920. At the time of Pearl Harbour in December 1944, his assignment was Commander 30 Corps with the rank of Lieutenant-General, in the Western Desert of Libya, where the first U.S.A. Troops to take part in Battle were attached in May 1942 to his Corps for Instructional purposes, under Senator Cabot Lodge. This was the time when Rommel was acting like a shark amongst smaller fish, having all the advantages of superior equipment, yet he failed to reach EGYPT, and was later decisively beaten at EL ALAMEIN.

In his younger days, Sir Willoughby Norrie was a successful amateur Steeplechase rider, and a well known Hog-Hunter in India, being runner-up of the famous Kadir Cup. He commanded the 10th Royal Hussars in which H.R.H. the Duke of Gloucester served. Incidentally, he created a World record by killing a wild boar in India from his horse with his stirrup iron and without any other form of weapon.

He has been a popular and esteemed Governor of South Australia for the last five years, and King George VI has recently extended his period of Office for a further three Years. Governor Norrie has received many messages of congratulations on his unique feat from all over the World, though he has not yet received enquiries from Madame Tussauds!

We admire his sportsmanship in note submitting "a Claim", but as Mr.C.R. Cowell remarks this catch of nearly one ton will go down to history as belonging to His Excellency Sir Willoughby Norrie, and will stimulate other Anglers to visit South Australian Waters, about which the late Zane Grey once wrote- "I know' of no place in the World where Australia's premier sporting fish- the white death shark -is so numerous, as in South Australia's protected Gulf's. Although the White Pointer Shark predominates, there are many other sharks top be caught, Mako, Cocktail and Blue-Gum – also Tuna (Tunny) and Australian Salmon up to 12lb. Here is the story straight from the mouth of The Governor, and not from the mouth of the shark, although a photograph of the latter appears below.

Account. In a special interview, Sir Willoughby Norrie gives this graphic account:- I was always keen to catch a Shark and gladly accepted an invitation from Dr. A.L. Tostevin of Adelaide- the owner of the good 48 ft Yacht "NYROCA"- to re-Visit Port Lincoln waters.

The President of the Game Fishing Association of Australia (Mr.G.R. Cowell) had warned me that one of the attractions of Shark Fishing off Port Lincoln was that no two sharks ever did the same thing when hooked and that one could never tell for certain how they would re-act. The dates fixed for the expedition were March 13th to 17th, of this year, but during most of this period the weather was unfavourable for fishing, due to strong South and South-East winds.

As a result of these conditions, the Skipper (W.G.Green) decided it would be wiser to try our luck in the vicinity of the Banks Group of Islands, which is a famous and popular locality for big sharks. On March 15th we anchored off Winceby Island, and conditions appeared quite good for laying a trail of Oil from the blubber of a dead Seal. Nobody knows more about fishing than Jim Green, and I would never have got this fish without him: He was confident all along we would get one.

We had been in position a couple of hours and the Crew were all resting, whilst I was sitting in the swivel chair astern "looking out" when suddenly an enormous shark appeared, the first I had ever seen under such conditions.

It was a real thrill to see such a Monster so clearly: the shark "shook" the dinghy viciously, and then circled round the YACHT once, before going straight for one of the lures hanging over the stern of the boat.

The Skipper, in the meanwhile, had been warned and arrived in time to see that the Shark meant to take the second lure as soon as possible. We were begged by others on board for extra time to get Cameras ready, but the fish was both impatient and hungry!

This delay took, I suppose, about a minute, and the fish was obviously determined to get the second lure, whether Cameras were ready or not: He came in at it, with his jaws wide open, when the bait (with the two hooks attached) was dropped into his open mouth, as he rose out of the water to within a few inches of the deck.

The fish made two gashes with his teeth in the sides of "Nyroca" in attacking the lures. It seemed an appreciable time before the Shark decided to make a run, although it was probably nor more than fifteen seconds. The fish then went off at a strong slow trot, rather than at a gallop. As soon as I felt first pressure on my line, I struck vigorously and was confident that he had been well and truly hooked. Although I had caught striped Marlin (315lb) in New Zealand, this was my first experience at Shark fishing, so it was a case of real beginner's luck. We were not more than half-a-mile from the shore and were in comparatively shallow waters (about 31/2 fathoms) which definitely assisted in catching the fish. He went out to a maximum distance of 400 to 500 yards, but the fish was not spectacular, did not jump once or attempt to move really quickly- like a Marlin usually does. It was more a case of a hard and long tussle getting him closer and closer to the Ship, by the "pumping" method, which is quite fatiguing. The Shark, a White Pointer was hooked at 2.58pm and it was not until after 4.50pm that he was alongside "Nyroca".

We knew the fish was a very big one-probably over 1500lb we sought- but during the fight, none of us had any ideas of World records or International Game Fishing Rules being involved, nor was this ever mentioned. I had one object and that was to get that fish and we did it. During the latter stages of the battle, I had trouble in working my reel (which I had never previously used), and in adjusting the clutch, the Skipper came to my assistance over working the Reel, but at no stage did anybody play the fish, except myself and of course, I never left my chair until the fish was safely "Gaffed" and alongside. Talking about chairs, this particular one had not been used for ten years, and on the last occasion Mr. G.R. Cowell had caught his record fish of 1919lb also from the same ship-Dr. Tostevin's "Nyroca".

I wore the usual harness which Game Fisherman do, but I had mine made out of soft Kangaroo hide, which was very satisfactory and I can recommend this type of support.

The normal sized rod I had borrowed from G.R. Cowell was perfect, the line used was a 54-thread, and seemed more than adequate for the purpose. I had750 yards of line on my reel, which had a small handle and I found difficult to work. I felt all the time, I needed more Leverage and a longer handle. After this expedition, I was interested to notice in a photograph of the late Zane Grey in South Australian waters, that he had an outsize handle on his reel, When we returned to Adelaide to the tune of "Here the conquering Hero comes" I was invited to sign a form rather like an income Tax Return, stating I had observed all the laws and rules of the International Game Fishing Association, on reading these, it was clear that applications for recording Game Fishing Catches could only be submitted if they complied strictly with the many rules, and I naturally decided I could not submit a claim

The Rule I unwittingly infringed read as follows: -

The angler must hook, fight, and bring the fish to gaff unaided by any other person. Acts of persons other than the angler in adjusting reel drag or touching any part of the tackle during the playing of the fish are not permissible". My reel was touched during the excitement of battle and in the circumstances; I could not lodge a claim. The rules are International and therefore must be interpreted and observed as published. As Patron of the Game Fishing Club of South Australia, I am naturally very disappointed that I have deprived South Australia of the honour claiming the World's record fish, although I still have the great satisfaction of having landed him.

Looking back on the event, when it is so easy to be wise, I was perhaps in little too much of a hurry and if I had taken more time, nobody need have touched my reel. The boat remained anchored the whole time and I fished from the same position, which I believe is unusual. The official weight of the Shark was 2,225lb, its lengths was 15ft 7inches and girth 8 ft and 81/2inches, Caught with Rod and Line 54 thread.

The Shark was a Female and the "post-mortem" Revealed that she was in very healthy condition, with no young. She was very well hooked at the base of the throat, behind the gills, and the undigested remains of a dog and 2 seals were found inside her.

It was not possible for us to judge her age, but she appeared to be a lone spinster who preferred quieter waters to the fashionable and perhaps over- populated shark resorts round Dangerous Reef. A great deal of publicity has been given to this fish, which I hope will once more bring notice to South Australia as waters whish can truthfully be regarded as a Game Fishermen's Paradise. I hope to have another crack in 1951, and next time will be more careful!

The President of the Game Fishing Association of Australia and Australian representative of the International Game Fishing Association (Mr. G. R. Cowell) said:-

"The fact that The Governor feels unable to lodge a claim on technical points of rules does not detract from the very fine effort. I sympathise with him as the rules are very strict, but his action supports the purpose of both organisations which I represent. Sir Willoughby's fish, though not officially recordable. Will be remembered perpetually as a magnificent catch, and South Australians will always be proud of his achievements in their Waters. Anglers all over the world will hope that he may soon repeat his performance on the official records, and they will appreciate this example of fair play and true sportsmanship". "CAUGHT< SIR".

Everybody will share His Excellency the Governor's regret at his discovery that because of some unsuspected infringement of the rules of big game fishing during the excitement of the battle, he cannot submit his Port Lincoln Shark catch as a World's record. However, though the record" got away", the shark did not. It fell to a sportsman whose beginner's luck-as he modestly described it- was also a stroke of good fortune for South Australia. A famous shark it would have been whoever had caught it, but that it was hooked fought and landed by the Governor gives it a distinction that can hardly fail to draw the eyes of deep-sea fisherman to the Port Lincoln waters from many parts of the World. Even if the saying does not properly belong to fishing, it was most certainly a case of. "Well caught, Sir".

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



I would also like to say congratulations to the COAST 2 COAST TEAM of organizers for running such a great well run event and thanks to all the sponsors that make it possible it's awesome.









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


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
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


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
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



Sydney Kingfish Recaptured 4 Times

A juvenile yellowtail kingfish tagged and released in the Parramatta River by young gun Gianni Lo Guidice on 8 September 2018 has been recaptured.... for the 4th time. Including the original tag and release the fish has now been caught an unbelievable 5 times in just 126 days. The recapture summary is as follows:

Originally tagged Parramatta River on 08/08/2018 @ 70cm

- Recaptured and released 42 days later in Sydney Harbour 20/10/2018 @ 71cm
- Recaptured and released 44 days later in Sydney Harbour 03/12/2018 @ 71cm
- Recaptured and released 9 days later in Sydney Harbour 12/12/2018 @ 71cm
- Recaptured and retained 31 days later in Sydney Harbour 12/01/2019 @ 73cm

Overall the fish spent 126 days at liberty and travelled an estimated straight line distance of over 15 nautical miles (~27km) between release and recapture. These recaptures really go to show how tough these popular sports fish are.

Southern Bluefin Tuna heads across the Ditch

A southern bluefin tuna (SBT) has been reported as recaptured.

An observer from the National Institute of Water & Atmospheric Research (NIWA) in New Zealand retrieved the tag from a commercial fishing vessel which had been fishing off the coast

New Zealand. After some quick correspondence with the New Zealand observer, the details of the recapture were determined. The SBT was originally released on 28 February 2016 by Adelaide Game Fishing Club angler Jay Dent Offshore from Rocky Island in South Australia. After a quick fight on 24kg line, the fish was quickly tagged and subsequently released in excellent condition.

The fish was estimated to be 96cm and 15kg. On 27 November 2018 the fish was recaptured by a New Zealand longline vessel in the area known as the Tauranga Trough. Upon recapture the fish was estimated at 112cm & 24kg. During the fish's 877 days at liberty it had travelled an estimated straight line distance of Recapture forms

If you do happen to catch a tagged fish, be sure to report it either over the phone on (02) 6691 9602 or online by using the online recapture form linked below: http://www.dpi.nsw.gov.au/fishing/recreational/resources/fish-tagging/game-fish-tagging/gamefish-recapture. Each recapture provides vital information which is essential to improve the understanding and management of valuable game fish and sport fish species. Details of the distance that the fish travelled and its growth are sent to the anglers who first tagged the fish and the anglers who recaptured it. A recapture certificate is also issued, along with a hat or t-shirt for those really exciting recaptures!

Don't forget to return your tag cards

This is a great time to remind everyone to return their tag cards to their local game fishing club or back to the tagging program. We are still awaiting the original release information for many species from past seasons. Please have a look around and send back your completed cards, even if they are several years old as they may still match up with recaptured fish that we have on the database. Also, please keep us updated with fish that you saw were tagged but were unable to retrieve the tag from. It is still useful to log this information so that we can get a better overall estimate on the number of recaptures that are taking place.




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
